

Tamaskan Dog Register, Inc. Temperament Evaluation Criteria and Guidelines

The Tamaskan Dog Register, Inc. (TDR) requires temperament evaluations for dogs applying to be a part of the TDR breeding program if:

- The dog is not a Tamaskan Dog (i.e., the breeding candidate is an outcross);
- The dog is G1 Tamaskan Dog who is the product of a TDR-registered outcross litter; or
- If a concern has been expressed regarding the dog or its ancestry in terms of behavior or demeanor.

While the TDR prefers the use of certified temperament evaluators, it is understood that not all breeders or prospective breeders have easy access to these resources. As such, these guidelines are intended to be used by both professional and at-home evaluators. These criteria are formatted such that a professional evaluator will understand the item being tested, and the temperament aspects sought in the breed. Concurrently, an at-home evaluator will be able to utilize these guidelines as steps to execute an evaluation.

Instructions

For at-home evaluations, **video submission of the dog's test is required**. Videos must be close and clear enough to clearly observe the dog's reactions. The evaluation may be recorded as a single (continuous) video, or comprise multiple videos, as long as all items within this test are recorded. For professionals utilizing this guide, video is encouraged.

In all cases, <u>please complete each item with as much detail as possible.</u> Submissions lacking detail will be rejected. Please return completed evaluations to the Committee of Breeders at cob@tamaskandogregister.com.

Point System

Each test item is scored on a range of one to four points, as described below:
